The 2018 consultation told the Alliance that people wanted to be better connected: with each other, with evidence and with support. Now it wants to know how well it has helped you do that, if those priorities remain, and how it might build on what has achieved together so far.

April's Month of the Military Child: Carterton College case study—Chris Hart, Headteacher

Students and staff at the college participated in a number of events during the last week of April celebrating the Month of the Military Child. A mixture of awareness raising activities and opportunities for celebration and enrichment took place in a busy week.

Throughout the week, Tutor Periods were devoted to raising awareness for our non-service students of the unique challenges and opportunities our Service children encounter. Linking to our school values of kindness and resilience, we reflected on the challenges of separation and postings as well as relocating to new parts of the country and changing schools. Students all had a chance to write a 'bluey' which really brought the importance - and sometimes the challenge - of communication with loved ones away from home.

A number of our service students went to RAF Brize Norton to join students from other local schools to watch the RAF Falcons display on the Tuesday, and the whole school gathered together to watch them drop onto the school field on Wednesday lunchtime. Service family members able to attend joined us for afternoon tea.

Wednesday was our 'purple day'. We invited all our cadets to wear their uniforms to school and all students received a purple lapel badge. We chose to give them a Queen's Diamond Jubilee commemorative badge which we thought would make a nice souvenir. Donations were invited from students and parents for Jon Eggings Trust who do fabulous work with our students, including a trip to Rolls Royce, Bristol on Thursday.

Aware that schooling can be disrupted for some Service students, we prioritise support for them through our life skills enrichment programme; on Thursday a number of Service students from Years 7 - 11 received basic First Aid Training in our Service student hub; 'The Hangar'.

Our MOTMC activities were co-ordinated by Mrs Hannah Owen, Service Pupil Premium Lead, supported by staff and our Service Student Ambassadors, who were described in our recent OFSTED reports as 'impressive' student leaders.
