Armed Forces children in 16-19 education

'Diversity meets Complexity'
Report published in October 2022

This fascinating report is well worth a look, irrespective of whether you work in the Post 16 phase. Based on a literature review, focus groups with young people, a practitioners' survey, staff interviews and discussions with experts, Diversity meets Complexity outlines the needs of military students in this age-group together with many of the barriers they face.

Building on the Thriving Lives Toolkit for schools and its self -evaluation framework, the findings of this research have led to the creation of seven 'best practice' principles for 16 -19 settings, along with some underpinning considerations:

- 1. Data and identification: we know our Armed Forces young people an their families
- 2. Culture: our culture recognises and celebrates the experiences of Armed Forces families
- 3. Transition: we provide specialist support for young people from Armed Forces families as they join and leave our setting.
- 4. **Staff awareness**: our staff are well-informed about the experiences and needs of Armed Forces young people
- 5. Wellbeing: the wellbeing of Armed Forces young people is prioritised and supported
- 6. Achievement: the achievement of Armed Forces young people is maximised
- 7. Parental engagement: we work with and involve parents from our Armed Forces community.

The paper's authors also stress that: "Student engagement should underpin all practice"

WANTED! Can you help?

A small team of advisers are on the look out for examples of good practice in schools linked to one of the 7 Principles of the SCiP Alliance's *Thriving Lives Toolkit*. Their project, running across 2023, aims to publish 50 school case studies to exemplify good practice against the Alliance's self-evaluation framework, thereby supporting other school leaders who wish to use it.

The team are particularly keen to include schools with small numbers of Service children on roll.

DID YOU KNOW?

Since Service Pupil Premium stops at the age of 16, many FE Colleges do not know who their Service children are, since there is no financial incentive in finding out. This makes tracking their outcomes impossible. Staff in schools with 6th forms generally know about their military cohort due to SPP figures in Y11. This is one of a number of systemic issues being highlighted to policymakers.
