#### Advocating for your child and ensuring their needs are best met in school

Many care-experienced children have suffered disrupted learning, may have missed extended periods of school, and many of them have special educational needs (SEN). The gaps in their learning and, in many cases the emotional impact of their experiences, are likely to have become significant barriers to their progress. Schools have a duty to understand the things which can affect how care-experienced learn and achieve and how the whole school supports the educational achievement of these pupils.

#### Care-experienced children must explicitly be identified as a cohort requiring specific consideration and targeted support pathways.

Care-experienced children are more likely to experience social, emotional and mental health (SEMH) issues than their peers. SEMH needs are special education needs. For these children and young people, we insist that schools use the <u>SDQ assessment (xls format)</u> to diagnose a child's **SEMH needs** and support in putting together a needs-based intervention plan.

Many care-experienced children also have additional Special Education Needs or Disabilities (SEND). Education settings have a duty to use their best endeavours to meet the educational needs of children with SEND and **schools should be utilising the <u>SEN Ordinarily Available Toolkit (pdf</u> <u>format, 1.4Mb)</u> to support this work. Oxfordshire Virtual School is committed to supporting all schools who support our children to ensure they are places where our children feel they are cared for and belong. We promote that schools adopt a relational and restorative way of working that is attachment and ACEs aware, trauma-informed and shame-sensitive.

# Personal Education Plan (PEP) reminder

The deadline for holding Spring PEP meetings for Children We Care For is Friday 9<sup>th</sup> February 2023 (before the half-term week). The reason for this is that it gives Virtual School case holders time to quality assure the PEP documents and process Pupil Premium Plus (PP+) funding requests before the close of the 2023/24 financial year.

PEP meetings after this date will be processed in the new financial year (from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2024).

- The Virtual School provides up to £2,000 per financial year for pupils placed in Oxfordshire.
- The Virtual School provides up to £2,500 per financial year for pupils placed out of county.

If you are concerned that your child's Pupil Premium allocation has not been fully utilised to support the best possible outcomes, contact your child's Designated Teacher as the allocated money cannot be rolled over to the next financial year. Pupil Premium funding requests will be approved in-line with our PP+ policy on our website:

# Year 10s and 11s with EHCPs

Please contact your child's school if they are in Year 11 and you are concerned about them not having a clear destination named on their EHCP for Post-16 education, employment or training. Due to the lengthy consultation process, there is often a last-minute rush in March to name somewhere, which may end up not being the appropriate destination *or* may not provide the preferred course option which can lead to confusion, disappointment and/or young people becoming NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training).

For those of you with children in Year 10, especially those with EHCPs, it is a good idea to encourage them to attend Open Events this year to start getting an idea about their preferred destination. See p.4 for a list of provisions in or near to Oxfordshire. If your child has an EHCP, they should have their Annual Review at the end of Year 10 or very early in Year 11 to enable those early consultations to take place.

## This term is key for Year 11 and Post-16 students

Please build in time to apply to Sixth Forms, universities, colleges and apprenticeships and ask your child's educational setting for support. Try to take a copy of applications and ensure (if they are a Child We Care For) they put their social worker down as one of the key contacts. This makes following up applications much easier – i.e. have they actually applied, have they missed phone calls asking them to interview, etc.
