 Contribute to reducing the gap in higher education participation between the most and least represented groups.


 Equip young learners from underrepresented groups to make an informed choice about their options in relation to the full range of routes into and through higher education.

 Contribute to a stronger evidence base around 'what works' in higher education outreach












How many service pupils progress to higher education?



DIAGRAM 1: Higher education progression of Service and non-Service non-FSM children



- The progression rate to higher education for service pupils has been decreasing.
- Non service pupil, non free school meal students progress at approx. 50%
- Service pupils progress at approx. 45%

Any move can lead to a fall of at least 14-15% in the percentage of pupils achieving English and Maths grade 5-9.

Service children are over 3 times more likely to move schools than the general population.

Five major challenges



- Mobility
- Separation from serving parent
- Students with disabilities and young carers
- Inconsistent support
- Socio-economic background

Children of those in higher ranks indicated the greatest intent to go to university and to join the military while those of NCOs (non-Commissioned officers) indicated the lowest intent to go to university and no particular intent to join the military.

Why important to this area



The local authorities with the most service pupils were/are Hampshire, Wiltshire, Lincolnshire, North Yorkshire, and **Oxfordshire**.

Of all 29 Uni Connect partnerships across England, the Study Higher region has the **fourth highest number** of service pupils in secondary school.
