Funding for Previously Cared For Children

School funding is based on census data, so it's vital to ensure that information about your previously cared for children cohort is up-to-date.

Previously cared for children - referred to by the Department for Education (DfE) as previously looked after children or PLAC - are children no longer in local authority care because they are the subject of an Adoption, Special Guardianship or Child Arrangement Order. Children who have gone back to live at home with no Child Arrangement Order are unfortunately not eligible for this funding. Since 1st April 2024, Pupil Premium Plus funding is also available for pupils who have been adopted from care or have left care from outside of England and Wales.

<u>Pupil Premium Plus funding</u> is overseen by the Department for Education. For the financial year 2025 to 2026, the Pupil Premium Grant equates to £2,630 per Previously Cared For Child per annum.

To secure the Pupil Premium Grant, it is the responsibility of the educational setting to prompt parents and guardians who need to inform the setting about their child's circumstances (along with evidence) in time for the setting to record the child's status on their census. We suggest that you include a question regarding previously in care status both on your admissions form and at regular intervals when requesting information regarding Ever 6 FSM eligibility. Primary School Applications for CWCF

If you have CWCF currently in Foundation 2 (F2), it's time for their carers to apply for a primary school place. Corporate parents of children born between 1st September 2021 and 31st August 2022 need to apply for an infant or primary school place for September 2026.

The deadline for completed applications is 15th January 2026.

Applications received by this date will be processed for National Offer Day on 16th April 2026. Missing the deadline means the application will be processed later in the year, and the child is far less likely to secure a place at one of the preferred schools. Please discuss options with the child's Social Worker and Virtual School Caseworker to ensure the best outcome.

Post 16 Transition

Remember that some of your Year 11s may need additional support with the process of applying to colleges.

Ideas to support children we care for:

- DT call carer to explain the process (especially for carers who have not had a Year 11 before).
- Time in school researching courses, talking to ex-students and support with application form.
- Flag up open events and identify a member of staff to meet them at college to facilitate the visit.
- Ask college course leader to come in and talk to a group in school.

What is the SDQ for?

The strengths and difficulties questionnaire is an important tool to help professionals identify emotional and behaviour concerns and to flag up the need for further assessment. It supports discussion in PEP meetings and enables professionals to see specific areas which may need targeted intervention. Tracking SDQ data is important as unmet SEMH needs are one of the key reasons for educational underachievement in children we care for (CWCF) and previously cared for children. Preventing suspensions and exclusions is critical. The SDQ can be part of the identification of needs, as often this is missed. **Vulnerable and SEND pupils are more likely to be excluded** and there is an understanding that more compassionate schooling is needed. All local authorities are required to provide information on the emotional and behavioural health of CWCF. This data is collected through the SDQ and a summary score for each child issued for tracking the emotional and behavioural difficulties of CWCF at a national level.

Oxfordshire Virtual School Annual Conference 2025: Transforming Lives Through Human Connection

This year's conference brought together 147 delegates from across Oxfordshire to explore how human connection can empower care-experienced children to achieve their dreams. The day was designed to inspire and connect, beginning with a powerful keynote from broadcaster and author Ashley John-Baptiste, whose story of navigating the care system resonated deeply with attendees. Interactive sessions - including Appreciative Inquiry, body mapping, Conversation Café, and open space discussions - encouraged participants to reflect on their roles as corporate parents and share strategies for supporting care-experienced children.

Delegates reflected on the importance of building connections, the value of professional roles and the hopes and challenges faced by care-experienced young people. Feedback from delegates was overwhelmingly positive. 100% agreed that the conference inspired them to empower care-experienced children to pursue their dreams. Many cited the opportunity to connect with other professionals, hear diverse voices and reflect on their practice as key takeaways. The interactive format and engaging activities were particularly appreciated, with several noting that the conference was a welcome change from traditional setups.

Attendees shared practical examples of how the conference would change their practice, such as ensuring pupil voice is central to discussions, advocating for more support for adopted and SGO children, and providing practical toolkits for students approaching adulthood.

Many left feeling inspired, better connected and equipped to bring about positive change for care-experienced children in Oxfordshire. Protocol on leave of absence requests

In exceptional circumstances, requests may need to be made for a leave of absence during term-time for children we care for (CWCF).

If this is the case, approval must be sought from both the Head of Service for CWCF and the Virtual School Head.

Schools / educational settings should not be approached directly by carers or social workers with such a request.

Carers and social workers must not apply for holiday in term time.

Any Year 11s with EHCPs should have had an Annual Review towards the end of Year 10 or have one booked before the end of Term 1 to ensure the EHCP that is sent out to Post-16 providers reflects the most current, accurate picture of the young person and their needs. It is also the opportunity to capture the young person's wishes and pull together everyone's thoughts on preferred Post-16 destinations. Schools can then request that the EHCP Casework Team send out consultations to providers as soon as possible before Christmas - this allows plenty of time for places to be agreed before the end of March deadline when the destination is named on the EHCP. If the Annual Review has not yet happened or been booked, or you are concerned that things have changed significantly, please flag this up with your SENDCo, copying in their Virtual School case holder.



A corporate parent is the name given to an organisation or person who has special responsibilities to children we care for and care experienced young people.

A corporate parent is intended to carry out many of the roles a parent should. While you or your organisation may not be able to provide everything a parent can, you should still be able to provide the children and young people you're responsible for with the best possible support and care.

Corporate parent responsibilities are intended to encourage people and organisations to do as much as they can towards improving the lives of children we care for and care experienced young people, so they feel in control of their lives and are able to overcome the barriers they may face.

As corporate parents in Oxfordshire we are ambitious for our children we care for and care experienced young people. We are committed to working together to help children, young people, and families to thrive.

We want Oxfordshire to be a great place to grow up and for any Oxfordshire child or young person to have the opportunity to become everything they want to be.

To achieve this vision for children and young people we have a focus on all children and young people being successful, safe, healthy, and supported.
